NACCHO Grant-Factors For Success Demonstration Project

Thanks to 4 MRC volunteers and the MRC leadership team our unit completed 12 documents, including 3 Standard operating plans, multiple FAQs, timelines and more for this grant. The documents focused on alerting, activating and demobilizing volunteers. Over 60 hours of volunteer time was put into making the documents during a month and a half and even more hours were given during the review period. The grant documents were submitted in mid December and the national MRC office will be sharing them across the nation as resources for other units to be able to implement into their plans.



Seasonal Flu Clinic Success

Thank you to our MRC nurses for a successful fall 2013 of seasonal flu clinics! We had over 20 MRC nurses give vaccinations in over 29 school flu clinics with both Columbus Public Health (CPH) and Franklin County Public Health (FCPH). Volunteers vaccinated children at school based clinics in Columbus City Schools and Southwestern City Schools in the month of November and December. To prepare for the large amounts of clinics , volunteers attended an immunization training (FCPH hosted two) to familiarize them with staff and public health protocol.

Closing out 2013!

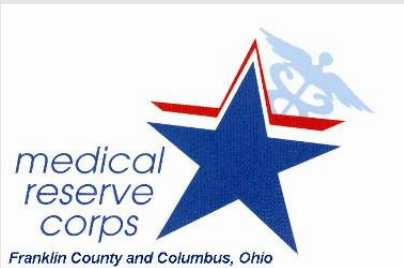
- We had over 20 MRC nurses give vaccinations in over 29 school flu clinics.
- We had 30 MRC volunteers give out thousands of public health information flyers and almost 1,500 bottles of hand sanitizer at the county and state fairs.
- MRC volunteers participated in exercises with Nationwide Children's Hospital, the Franklin County Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency, HandsOn Central Ohio, Columbus City Schools, both Health Departments, and the Airport.
- MRC volunteers participated in the Franklin County Citizen Corps Training Summit.
- We had over 95 MRC volunteers participate in National Preparedness Month activities this past September.
- We had 23 MRC volunteers participate in 4 Franklin County Public Health rabies vaccination clinics.
- We had 17 MRC volunteers assist with multiple Columbus Public Health farmer's markets.
- We trained, exercised and engaged over 1,900 MRC volunteers this year (not a unique count).
- We recruited 174 new MRC volunteers this year.

May 8th Full Scale Hospital Exercise

The Central Ohio Trauma System and all of the Central Ohio region hospitals are having a full scale exercise on May 8th, 2014. Like many of our past exercises we will need several hundred volunteers to participate as "victims". Volunteers will be transported and processed through a hospital emergency department based on the exercise scenario. Volunteers will get "moulage" or fake injuries to make it more realistic for clinicians. MRC leadership team members will be helping to manage the volunteers the day of the event. VOLUNTEER TEAM Updates

Leadership Team:

This team continues to meet/coordinate on a monthly basis either in person or via conference call. The purpose of this team is to encourage leadership among volunteers and to get feedback from active volunteers on the direction of the FC&C MRC. Leadership Team members will be eligible for leadership roles in a large scale emergency and have the opportunity to participate in additional volunteer opportunities that do not go out to the general MRC group. Leadership positions are currently open. Next Team Meeting will be: A conference call on January 15th, 2014. Email tessafite@franklincountyohio.gov to get call in information.

Mental Health Team:

Mental health is an important part of an emergency response. Our mental health volunteers take a Psychological First Aid training and support both the health departments and partners in the community during a response. We partner with ADAMH and the Red Cross. We have recently developed Just-In-Time Training materials and Job Action Sheets. We last met on August 20th. We will meet again in early spring 2014. Members of this team include (but not limited to); LSWs, RNs, Psychologists, Psychiatrists, School Counselors and more.

Language Team:

Are you fluent in another language in addition to English? Are you willing to volunteer to help with language capabilities during a disaster? We would love to have you serve on a language team. This team does outreach in the community year round through participation in festivals and training. We meet on a semi annual basis. Next Team Meeting will be: Summer, 2014. Email notification will go out to volunteers signed up on the language team.

POD Team:

A POD, or Point of Dispensing, is a method of response in a public health crisis requiring the widespread distribution of medication. In the event of such an emergency, multiple PODs may be set up throughout the community to offer medication to many people. Clinical volunteers such as pharmacists, nurses, paramedics, and physicians are encouraged to join as well as non-clinical members in a support role. POD team members can participate in several trainings, drills and exercises per year. Completion of POD101 online is a requirement. <http://www.volunteermrc.com/training.html>
