Our volunteers gave feedback about those materials, and helped to design the response for Franklin County. FC&C MRC Launches POD Team

Franklin County & Columbus MRC would like to extend an invitation to all volunteers that have completed an orientation session to join the growing team of POD Team volunteers! A POD, or Point of Dispensing, is a method of response in a public health crisis requiring the widespread distribution of medication. In the event of such an emergency, multiple PODs may be set up throughout the community to offer medication to many people.

Clinical volunteers such as pharmacists, nurses, paramedics, mental health professionals and physicians are highly encouraged to join the POD Team. As always, non-clinical members of the community are also an important component of the FC&C Medical Reserve Corps, and play a large role in the POD action! To run a successful POD, many skills will be needed. Those volunteers with traffic control, computer, data entry, management, reception and other skills will be needed in a response.

POD Team members will complete a short online training, still in the process of being created, and will also participate in our drills and exercises. The FC&C MRC is planning several large POD Exercises over the next few years, and your help with

All MRC volunteers in the region are invited to participate in the Level One Screening/Dispenser POD Drill on January 30-31 at Columbus Public Health, 240 Parsons Ave, Columbus, OH. The drill will include an overview of personal protective equipment and updates about the Columbus & Franklin County POD plans and MRC structure.

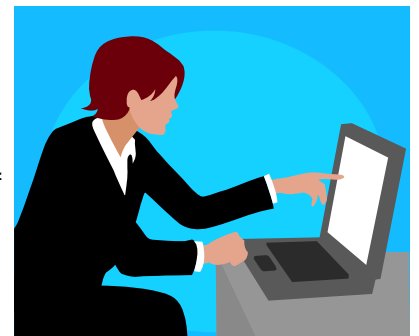
We will need volunteers during the following times to help out, play patients, and give feedback: 8:30-11:30am or 12pm-3pm on either Jan 30 or 31. New volunteers or those without medical backgrounds are especially encouraged to volunteer their services, but as with all MRC trainings, any community member dedicated to public health is welcome! - The Franklin County & Columbus MRC is a part of the Ohio Citizen Corps system. Check out the state's most recent newsletter at www.serveohio.org/CitizenCorps/newsletter/07dec/.
- BE ON THE LOOKOUT! The FC&C MRC is organizing a free **Psychological First Aid** class for March 2008, most likely on a Saturday. It is a four hour course, and covers great information about mental health in a disaster for all types of providers. An email will be on the way soon. We hope you can join us!
- The American Red Cross of Greater Columbus will be hosting **Foundations of Disaster Mental Health (FDMH)** on Saturday, February 23rd from 9am to 5pm. FDMH furnishes licensed mental health care professionals with the basic knowledge needed to function as Red Cross mental health care workers. The course introduces participants to the various psychological interventions employed by Red Cross volunteers in response to the needs of people across the entire continuum of disaster preparedness, response and recovery. It also addresses the legal and ethical issues that emerge for mental health workers in a disaster setting. Participants can receive 6.5 hours of CEUs for the successful completion of the course. - The Center for Public Health Preparedness and Disaster Response invites you to participate in the Department of Homeland Security funded and approved disaster preparedness course, electronic **Core Disaster Life Support (tm)** (eCDLS(tm)). CDLS is a nationally recognized all-hazards course designed to increase emergency responder awareness of basic skills, competencies, knowledge, and resources that are critical for a coordinated and effective local emergency response effort. The electronic version, eCDLS, allows first responders the flexibility to access this important training when and where it is convenient for them. By completing the course you may earn up to a maximum of 4 AMA PRA Category 1 Credits. Prospective participants should email Suraj Madoori at ecdls@ama-assn.org for information.
